Spaghetti Dinner 2016

It's true! October is Italian Heritage Month in recognition of the many achievements, contributions, and successes of Americans of Italian descent. Therefore, more than 70 members brought their goodwill and their appetites on a beautiful warm fall afternoon to Triangle Park in Baird Creek to celebrate this recognition. And celebrate they did!

Patrick Kloster (affectionately known as Patrizio Closterelli) was the ever-ready Master of Ceremonies who wore a few hats this day. As sound engineer, his oversight made sure we never wanted for music. His Iphone conveniently doubled as a DJ. Melodies old and new wafted from the sound system

graciously provided by Mark Mariucci's clan. As MC, Patrizio kept the event rolling along sharing tidbits while directing members to the appetizers, main course or the dancefloor.

During the socializing hour, members were treated to an aromatic Sicilian eggplant antipasto caponata and was made by Peg Ricci Anderson and a round of Can you guess which Italian American said this.

Looking around it was great to see new members, guests, and alums chitchatting or with heads together filling in their guessing sheet.

Then it was time for the main course. And we were not disappointed. The planning committee cooked up one of the best spaghetti sauces the club has ever had. Thanks to the culinary chops of Fatima and Patrick, the sauce was

simply amazing. For the pasta, this year bucatini was chosen, also known as perciatelli, a thick spaghetti-like pasta with a hole running through the center. The name comes from Italian: buco, meaning "hole", while bucato or its Neapolitan variant perciato means "pierced." It was a hit. Along with this pasta, members and guests were treated to Luigi's fantastic sausage with peppers and onions and bread sticks, all done to perfection. Janice Galt once again provided the green salad with crisp mixed greens and farmer's market fresh tomatoes topped with Newman's organic balsamic and olive oil dress-

Finally, right when we all needed an opportunity to move and jumpstart digestion, **Patrizio** called us together for the one and only **tarantella**. No Italian wedding or celebration would be complete without the rhythmic song and dance of the **tarantella**. It is the most popular of all the Italian songs and it is even considered by many as the song of Italy. The song is both lively and graceful and the dance is one of light and quick steps mixed with passionate gestures. Its origin dates back to the Middles Ages and traces of a similar song can even be found in Magna Graecia.

Legend states that between the 15th and 17th centuries an epidemic of tarantism swept through the town of **Taranto** in southern Italy. This was as a result of being bit by the poisonous tarantula spider. The victim, which is referred to as the tarantata, was almost always a woman but never a high ranking lady or one of an aristocratic upbringing. Once bitten the tarantata would fall into a trance that could only be cured by frenzied dancing. People would surround the victim while musicians would play mandolins, guitars and tambourines in search of the correct rhythm. Each beat would have a different effect on the tarantata causing various movements and gestures. Once the correct rhythm was found it was almost certain that the tarantata was cured.

As legends have it there always seems to be more than one version. Another version states that a woman who was depressed and frustrated from the subordinate lifestyle would fall into a trance that could only be cured by music and dance. This normally lasted three days and during that time the tarantata would be the center of attention, which in turn would cure them of their frustrations and depressions. Of these two variations that most popular is the one in which the victim is bitten by the poisonous tarantula. This is why the tarantella is sometimes referred to as the dance of the spider.

With the lively beat of the tarantella in our ears and tapping feet, members formed three large circles and began. Circle right, circle left. Cross the floor with arm in arm.

And so it went as we danced through three renditions of this lively Italian folk song led by **Marlene Feira**.

Our club has some of the best darn cooks this side of Sicily, the dessert course was spectacular as well. Diners were treated to an amazing assortment of dolce: crunchy biscotti flavored with anise and chocolate dipped were provided by Mary Teofilo, Peg Ricci Anderson and Vicky Piccione Sobeck. Mary also made the rich and luscious tiramisu. Marlene Sparapani Feira baked a traditional delicious Italian ring cake called ciambellone cake (which translates to big donut). These amazing desserts were enough to tempt the devil himself!

Then it was time for clean-up and breakdown. As usual, many hands made the work light. This huge undertaking could not be possible without a dedicated planning committee. **Mille grazie** to everyone who contributed to making our 10th annual spaghetti dinner a huge success.
